### **LAUNCESTON STAMP CLUB**

8<sup>th</sup> December 2016 The Club held their regular monthly meeting at the Royal British Legion Rooms, Edymead, Westgate Street

Club Chairman Viv Sandercock welcomed members and guests The evening's speakers were Rex Eccott and Viv Sandercock, who individually presented displays of unique original items of postal memorabilia from their personal collections covering all aspects of the local postal service from its inception in Victorian times to the modern day.

12<sup>th</sup> January 2017 The Club held their first regular monthly meeting at the YeoImbridge Methodist Chapel Hall, Ladycross. Club Chairman Viv Sandercoc welcomed members and guests. Members were reminded that Launceston Stamp Fair will be held on 11<sup>th</sup> February 2017..The evening was then given over to Members' Displays from Rex Eccott, Viv Sandercock, Terry Mounce and Dave Richards who presented displays of original items of postal memorabilia ranging, respectively, from KGVI First Day Commonwealth Covers to Spanish Mining Commemoratives, Copies of late 19<sup>th</sup>C Devon & Cornish Newspapers and Legal Agreements and West Indian Maritime Issues.

9<sup>th</sup> February 2017 Club Chairman Viv Sandercock welcomed members and guests and asked the meeting to observe a minute's silence in remembrance of David Bennett who passed away recently. The Chairman introduced the evening's Speaker, Club member Roger Winn from St Breward. Roger introduced his collection of postcards from WWI commenting this was just a continuation, or the second part, of the presentation that he gave in December 2015. On that occasion he had explained that it all started in his early teens when his uncle, knowing of his interest in stamps, passed on some 30 postcards sent by family members to each other during the run-up to and the first half of the "Great War". This evening's display of over 70 more postcards covered the period from 1916 onwards mainly of simple messages on postcards from soldiers on Active Service at the Front to their families and loved ones at home. The collection extends to include postcards of naval and other ships, coloured photo-prints of flowers and family scenes, photo-type postcards of places, sometimes nameless, abroad The Chairman presented Roger with the Club's Certificate of Appreciation and thanked him for a most interesting and entertaining evening.

### **DAWLISH STAMP CLUB**

11<sup>th</sup> January 2017 – Was Chairman's Evening and a well attended meeting were rewarded by some excellent displays "Where in the World" a look at some remote stamp issuing nations. The Camel Posts of Sudan, Early stamps of Great Britain with corner letters PH (the Chairman's initials), some of the finer material of Sarawk and finally something very local "Starcross Postal History".

**8<sup>th</sup> February 2017** – AGM and members new acquisitions. The existing committee remained unchanged and no increase in membership fee was made. Members new acquisitions included a wide array of the Post Office vended stamp labels through to the imaginative use of an A3 size printer to produce better and more compact displays.

**8<sup>th</sup> March 2017** – James Hooper gave a superb display of Austria during the period just after WW1 when the country was suffering inflation. Some very interesting and unusual material was shown, quite a bit of which was very rare. This is a country not often seen.

# IF YOUR CLUB IS NOT MENTIONED THEY HAVE NOT SUBMITTED A REPORT

### IMPERIAL AIRWAYS INDIA -LONDON 1st FLIGHT 1932 by Jim Wigmore

According to Cyprus Study Circle member Malcolm Warwick this flight did not land in Cyprus as was intended and the following may add to the truth of this story. The source is reproduced from a web based display of airmail material supposedly from the fight concerned. I have only extracted that which relates directly to Cyprus.

### Palestine - Cyprus leg, 24 April

The first flight in the opposite direction left Tiberias for Cyprus on 24 April.

This cover is postmarked in Jaffa on 21 April and is addressed to

Limassol. It has a Tiberias transit mark on 22 April and would be flown to Cyprus 24 April.



Since there is no Cyprus arrival mark – did this happen?

The schedule was to leave Tiberias early on a Saturday morning, fly to Cyprus which was then left mid morning, fly to Rhodes (Castelrosso) which was left in the early afternoon and finally arrive in Athens in the evening. This is the critical statement.

Cyprus - Rhodes leg, 24 April The next cover is addressed to Rhodes and was flown on the Cyprus - Rhodes leg on 24 April. Although the cover arrived in Rhodes on 24 April, it was not backstamped until the next day, 25 April.

I find the above statement very odd, if arrival was on the 24th the authorities would have stamped the mail 24<sup>th</sup> April the fact they were stamped 25<sup>th</sup> April suggests that the mail did

not actually arrive until that date.



This raises the question of was the flight delayed?

If it was delayed, did this happen before Cyprus, or at Cyprus, and if before, was Cyprus bypassed to try and recover time in the schedule?

The next cover was backstamped on arrival in Athens on 25<sup>th</sup> according to the schedule it should have arrived on the 24<sup>th</sup> and seems to be further proof of the delay in the flight.

Assuming the Authorities in Cyprus had prior warning of the delay in the flight and the possibility of bypassing Cyprus they would have had time to send mail for the flight to Rhodes by sea.

### Cyprus - Athens leg, 24 April


The next cover is registered and is addressed to Greece. It is postmarked 22 April and was flown on the Cyprus - Greece leg on 24 April. According to the schedule it should have arrived on the 24<sup>th</sup> not the 25th



It has a commemorative cachet with a similar design, but different inscription from the one shown earlier. Again, the arrival backstamp was applied on the following day.



A similar cover in my own collection also has an arrival stamp of 25th April. There would appear to be a gap of one day between the scheduled arrival times at Castelrosso and Athens and the actual arrival times. The route being followed is shown below for reference



### SPEEDING UP THE MAIL by Jim Wigmore

Most people will quickly realise that a high proportion of mail out of and into Cyprus was Business related where speed of response was very important. In the days when there was no email or internet and telephone communication was very limited, reliance upon the mail service was paramount. The various postal authorities around the world were well aware of the need for rapid movement of mail and in general tried to make the best use of technology available to speed up service. Here are two examples of speeding up the mail.

**To accelerate mail to Cyprus in 1926** (ref Post Office Notice P635 of July 1926 a map of the route is included in the notice) a new weekly accelerated service was introduced as of 12<sup>th</sup> August 1926 where mail was flown to Marseilles and then by sea to Cyprus. This service was quicker by three days to Alexandria. The cover shown travelled on the 1<sup>st</sup> service dated 7<sup>th</sup> August 1929 and arrived at Famagusta on 19<sup>th</sup> August 1929. The rate was Empire Mail Rate of 1 ½ d plus an Airmail Fee of 3d. Research suggests that the mail was carried from Marseilles to Cyprus on PO ship "SS Maloja"





## 12<sup>th</sup> April 1930

Was the date of the 1st flight on the revised schedule between London & Karachi (ref Post Office Notice P635G maps of the route are

included in the notice) reducing the time from 6-8 days to 2½ days, calculated from London. Mail travelled by Air from London-Cologne-Nurnburg-Vienna-Budapest-Uskub-Salonika-Athens-Crete-Alexandria. The cover below was posted on 7<sup>th</sup> April 1930 in Malmo Sweden addressed to Limassol and routed via the revised service to Karachi.



It is backstamped on Arrival at Alexandria on 15<sup>th</sup> April 1930 and travelled to Cyprus by Khedival Mail Line ship, no other arrival marks appear.
