

SNIPPET

A few years ago two covers went for auction in New York, a Mulready, dated December 1840, had a 1p black & 2p blue attached, apparently because it was over the usual 1oz weight when travelled from Liverpool to Lancaster. It realised \$12,000. Our day's top sale thought the auctioneers!

They couldn't believe it when a couple of hours later it was beaten by a cover from Liberia. It carried two stamps 6c & 24c the cover told how it went to New York via a Liverpool Packet ship with a February 1860 receiving mark. The cover went for \$12,650, the best price for anything in Liberia's Postal History then and possibly even today. Why? Because the two stamps used were only used in 1860?

Well done to all who took the time and trouble to prepare entries for the competitions.

A special thanks needs to be said for the Competition Secretary for gathering and collating the entries along with his team of helpers who set up and loaded the frames on the day as well as doing the same job in reverse at the end of the day – **VERY WELL DONE**.

PROVENANCE IS EVERYTHING

As the author of Cyprus Study Circle – Study Paper No.3 – "Air Mails 1929 -1960" I frequently get asked my opinion about items of Air Mail relating to Cyprus.

Such was the case with the Zeppelin Post Card addressed to Cyprus, both front and rear are shown. According to its sale description it is from a flight by LZ-127 "Graf Zeppelin" notated as Sieger 24A being a Mediterranean Flight from Fredrichstien to Venice via Seville where mail was dropped. The Card is described as having travelled by sea from Seville to Cyprus and returned to Basel Switzerland as undelivered mail.

The described flight did take place and there are a number of known covers from this flight, many are shown on the web. Covers from later flights by LZ-127 also appear on the web for reference

If this Post Card can be proved to be from Sieger 24A it is a very rare item, but is it right?

Let us look at some of the other mail and markings.








Note how clear the pink carriage mark is on these two covers, that on the card is very faint though it appears a correct design for the flight.



Note the also Octagonal Seville cancel on the face of the cover left as opposed to the roller cancel applied to the card above, surely items from the same flight would treated the same and receive the same markings? The earliest use of the roller cancel so far seen and used at Seville appeared on Zeppelin Mail from the Sept 1929 Round the World Flight of LZ-127 see the

example below.

Note also that most of the mail carried on these Zeppelin Flights are purely philatelic, hence the variety of stamps used to cover the cost of postage. The stamps on the card are of one type and one value of a design used in the 50pf stamp on the cover above.



Given the reference material viewed and the differences noted along with the fact there is a lot of fraudulent Zeppelin Mail the jury is out as to the authentication of the card relating to the original request, it needs to be expertised and the owner has been advised accordingly.

This story is an object lesson to all. When buying potentially rare items make sure you really know what you are buying and make sure you get them properly expertised prior to parting with your hard earned cash.
